JEWS FIR JESUS

For the Christian who wants to learn about Jews and Evangelism

hether or not you enjoy Valentine's Day, there is a hidden benefit: it's a

great occasion to sift through true and false expectations about love.

Yeshua (Jesus) invites us to remember how love works. He points out what cards, candy, flowers, or special dinners won't: there is no way to love without opening ourselves up to pain. When people you love suffer, you suffer. When people you love don't love you back, you suffer. And the list goes on.

Suffering is generally seen as a problem to be avoided—a healthy approach in many situations. But the temptation to avoid all suffering at any cost is dangerous. Those who succumb eventually find their hearts bankrupt, unable or unwilling to risk personal comfort, and too frightened or too numb to love. Had that been the culture of the early church, I wonder how far the gospel would have gone.

I am not suggesting some bizarre form of spiritual masochism. Suffering in itself is not good, and not

what God intended for His creation. Yet God can, and often does, work good through suffering. Sometimes our suffering actually creates opportunities for love to flourish. We make sacrifices. Others make sacrifices on our behalf. People show up for one another. For that we can rejoice and be thankful. Maybe you are not suffering right now. In this, too, you can rejoice. But wait—it will happen.

We can thank God that we aren't suffering as much as we might, but suffering is part of everyone's reality. So why should you or I be exempt from something that everyone else must endure?

Job said, "People are born for trouble as readily as sparks fly up from a fire" (Job 5:7, New Living Translation).

When suffering strikes, it's natural to ask God, "Why?" Maybe a more helpful question is "What?" as in, "God, what do You want to do in and through me in this time of suffering? How can I experience and pass on Your great love?" It's right to ask for God to relieve suffering, and He often does. But let's not be too quick to fear suffering as the worst thing that can happen, or the first thing to avoid.

C. S. Lewis addresses human suffering in his book, The Problem of Pain. He writes, "Pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our consciences, but shouts in our pains. It is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world."

So we are meant to listen for God's voice when we suffer. But we need more than that. We need comfort.

I find comfort in serving a God who suffered. As famous Lutheran pastor and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "Only a s uffering God can help." Jesus knows our pain. For love's sake, He has already entered into our suffering, and helps us to bear it. But there's more. If we belong to Him, we have entered into His suffering and death. And we will share in His resurrection and glory.

Paul wrote, "I am glad when I suffer for you in my body, for I am participating in the sufferings of Christ that continue for His body, the church" (Colossians 1:24, New Living Translation). When we bring our suffering to a suffering God, it will always have meaning. Paul probably would not have had to endure such pain had he not loved Jesus, yet that very love helped him endure the pain.

During the Nazi Holocaust, a Lutheran pastor named Ernst Lohmeyer was arrested and condemned for opposing the regime. He was miraculously freed, only to be rearrested and executed by the Russians. Yet he wrote, "If God were to snatch us out of trials we would then be tried in ways that would be endlessly deeper and greater than all the trials that we must endure in human circumstances. But, dear friends, even in the deepest trials the sound of his voice is perceptible, blowing over us like incense" (Ernst Lohmeyer, Between the Swastika and the Sickle).

When sin ripped us apart, Jesus did not turn from our suffering; He took it upon Himself and transformed it into everlasting life and love.

Because we love God, we love what He loves. We sometimes suffer for the sake of that love.

In a world that is desperate for love and full of suffering, let's listen to the voice of God and feel it blowing over us like precious, sweet-smelling incense in the midst of each and every circumstance. Let's love God and love others . . .

Questions and Answers

Dear Bob, Jewish people have suffered so much from Christians over the centuries with the Holocaust and the Inquisition and so many other failings in the church. Shouldn't we spend our time with Jewish people apologizing for the many sins of the church rather than trying to win them to Christ?



t is true that a humble attitude is right for the believer to maintain when sharing what you believe, and that a dismissive disregard of the facts of history won't help in effective communication with Jewish people. It's true that some people involved in the Crusades or pogroms and the horrible anti-Semitic events of history were Christians. We cannot be so flippant when we say that those events were not Christian. Certainly the spirit of anti-Semitism is evil. Certainly when a real Christian considers racism in any form, including anti-Semitism, it should be rejected out-of-hand. And it's true that Jewish people will often point to these "Christian" events as reason to reject Jesus as Messiah.

Many Jewish people will try to keep the believer on the back foot, so to speak, and keep you 'apologetic.' That said, what is our responsibility as believers in regards to those outside the church?

Avi Snyder writes in his book, **Jews Don't Need Jesus (and other misconceptions)** about this issue among many others. "While it is right to ask forgiveness for the crimes of the church, it is not right to apologize on Yeshua's behalf. Jesus has done no wrong. Yeshua is not guilty of the crimes that evil men and women committed in his name any more than modern medicine is guilty of the crimes that Dr Mengele, the monster of Auschwitz, committed against the Jewish people in the name of medical science." (page 99)

Yes, apologize for your sins. Acknowledge your own wrongs. Then make sure you get on with it. Tell of the greatness of God who forgives your sins and has given you eternal life. And he wants to give your Jewish mate eternal life, too, right? Remember when King David understood forgiveness about his own fairly substantial sins (adultery and murder among them), he cried, "Create in me a clean heart, and renew my spirit in me...cleanse me Lord from my iniquity... then I will teach transgressors your ways, and many will be converted to you!" (Psalm 51)

reports from London, "I was in Berlin for our most recent meeting of the Jews for Jesus European board of directors when I had quite an encounter in a taxi. As I was chatting with the driver, who was from Turkey, I meant to say, 'Danke Schön' ('thank you' in German), but instead I said it in Hebrew—'Todah rabbah.' The taxi driver, whom I had assumed was a Muslim, immediately responded, 'Why did you speak to me in Hebrew? How did you know I am Jewish?' He pulled out his wallet and showed me a card depicting the Israeli flag. "I would never have expected to meet a Turkish Jewish taxi driver in Berlin, but there he was! We chatted about his family background, his preparation for his son's upcoming bar mitzvah, and what it was like to be Turkish and Jewish in Berlin. We also talked about a famous false messiah, Shabbetai Zvi, who ended up in Turkey, and how we could know if Yeshua is the true Messiah.

e want to introduce you to the Morgan family—Jeff, Yael, and their three sons. (Third is brand new!).

Jeff is from California but moved to Israel in 2003. He and Yael, a sabra (native Israeli), married in 2007. They had two kids and moved back to California in 2015.

It was a turbulent time for the family. Jeff says, "Yael and I always had a strong and respectful relationship, but the New Age spirituality that I practiced for 20 years had turned me into an isolated, depressed loner. I was anxious and hopeless and couldn't figure out why. I was at the peak of physical health, having created my own health and fitness YouTube channel in 2014, which drew over 70,000 subscribers. But spiritually I was a mess.

"Eventually, I hit bottom and pronounced myself a complete failure. Yael was seriously concerned for my wellbeing—until the miraculous happened. Jesus started revealing Himself to me, Yael, and our 10-year-old son Dylan all at the same time, yet separately! We each had amazing, multiple gospel encounters through people, as well as through online articles, videos, books—even TV. Everywhere we turned, Jesus was there, pouring out His love and drawing us closer to Himself."

Despite their attraction to Jesus, Jeff and Yael wondered how their family could still be Jewish if they believed in Jesus. When they landed on the Jews for Jesus website, they found story after story about Jewish people who had come to faith in Yeshua.

Jeff says, "On February 10, 2018 at 11:00 p.m., it all came together. I realized that Jesus is the one and only Saviour and Messiah of our people. My depression, fear, anxiety, and hopelessness were wiped away in one moment—I was a free man! Yael and I dropped to our knees and surrendered our lives to Yeshua." Yael later learned that her grandmother Miriam had been cared for by a Christian family during the Holocaust. When her father was captured and sent to Auschwitz, this family told Miriam to ask Jesus every day to save her father. She did so, and eventually her father, barely alive, was rescued right out of a mass burial pit. Miriam later told her mother that Jesus had answered her prayers. This was kept as a family secret that Yael discovered when she told her family about her new faith.

About a year ago, the Morgans became friends with one of our former staff who told them how much she'd enjoyed serving with us. Thanks to that connection and lots of prayer, they are now on board!

Jeff works mainly with our Communications department, particularly on our digital team, and since end of 2020, he's receiving missionary training in Tel Aviv where they have relocated. He helps us with our website, as well as with video production and YouTube channel management—so that others like him and Yael will be drawn to Jesus through the true-life stories of Messianic Jews.

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
