laine, president of the Jewish groups we'd collaborated with for the High Holidays, invited our team to their Tu B'Shevat (considered a New Year of the trees) celebration. Originally,

we were simply coming as guests. But all that changed when I received a phone message from Elaine just three weeks before the holiday.

Her tone was a bit panicky as she explained that the rabbi was in Israel and would not be back for Tu B'Shevat. The cantor was also unable to attend. Could I help? That is how I ended up leading holiday services for this local Jewish congregation!

After the service, most people lingered to talk. One after another asked me, "How long have you been the rabbi?" or "Are you the rabbi of this community

or another?" Each time, I explained that I'm not a rabbi, but a pastor—and very positive conversations about Jews for Jesus opened up. Everyone saw that being

Jewish and having faith in Jesus are not, as is often believed, mutually exclusive.

This was a rare and deeply meaningful way for us to express both our commitment to the Jewish community and our commitment to Jesus. Thanks to you, our part-

ners, for helping to make it possible!

Around 60 people attended the service. We had a tree-planting ceremony (pictured

on the cover), calling on a child whose grandfather had planted the first Tu B'Shevat tree on behalf of the organization. He planted the tree along with Elaine's husband, Lev. I gave a bit of background and



said some blessings; then we went back inside for some music and a Tu B'Shevat seder (liturgical meal). (Our Jews for Jesus Paris team organized the meal, the music, registration, etc.)

A few members had asked Elaine about Jews for Jesus, and she wanted us to have the opportunity to explain who we are. She told me that I, and anyone on our team, should feel free to explain Jews for Jesus in one-on-one conversations, during the seder meal, or after the service. The seder was quite good fun, and all of our team members had meaningful conversations.

Elaine (shown above with Joshua

Turnil) shared some news about the synagogue, and I gave the message from Scripture, quoting the apostle Paul, who described Israel as an olive tree upon which Gentiles who know the Messiah are grafted in.

We sang Hatikvah (Israel's national anthem) in Hebrew. Then I introduced the French version, explaining that it had been written by evangelical Christians who identified strongly with Israel. The words are quite beautiful and everyone there was touched. They had never sung it in French and robustly chimed in.

Elaine sang loudest of all.

The evening ended with Havdalah (a ceremony at sundown, at the close of Shabbat), led by Lev.

We'd met quite a few of the synagogue goers during the High Holidays. It was great to continue getting to know them, and to speak freely about our faith in Jesus. We also met some new people who were taken aback—in a positive way—to find that I was not a rabbi, much less that I serve with Jews for Jesus. One couple who lead a local cultural organization told me, "We want you to speak at our next event!"

Again, your prayers and support were a major factor in how this amazing event came together. We wanted you to share our joy and to be praying for Elaine, Lev, and all the people we connected with at the Tu B'Shevat celebration.

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ay is a season of sowing as well as reaping and Jesus wants us to take joy in both. "Sowing" and "reaping" are each mentioned 50 times in the Scriptures—sometimes in the same verse. Yeshua (Jesus) comments on a well-known maxim of His day in John 4:37–38:

For in this the saying is true: "One sows and another reaps." I sent you to reap that for which you have not labored; others have labored, and you have entered into their labors.

Jesus' statement comes on the heels of His conversation with the woman at the well, after she runs off to tell everyone about Him. He wanted His disciples to understand that God uses partnerships in His soul-saving work—implying that each should be humble about his or her role.

I have been thinking about this recently, and reflecting on our Jews for Jesus core values of passion for the lost, teamwork, and dedication.

Passion for the lost

Jesus told His disciples, "My food is to do the will of Him who sent Me" (John 4:34). Jesus had an immense hunger to do God's will—that's what

satisfied Him beyond anything else. And God's will was for people to repent and be saved. Note the urgency: Jesus warned His disciples, "Do you not say there are still four months and then comes the harvest?" In other words, don't rely on the routine, the normal seasons. The time is now. We must not miss opportunities. Some say that Jesus was pointing to the people coming out through the ripening grain fields from the Samaritan village as the visual illustration of this truth.

Teamwork

Regardless of which role we have

in the harvest at any given moment, we are all in this together. We all can rejoice in each other's labors, sharing the joy of success because, "neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God who gives the increase" (1 Corinthians 3:7). As you partner with us in Jews for Jesus, you likewise join with us in the sowing and in the reaping as well. I hope you also share in our joy.

This year we will continue to sow into new initiatives that require faith. Please pray for us as we continue to sow into Haredi (ultra-Orthodox) ministry, build our growing work in Jerusalem, continue to find ways to connect with our new neighbors now that our New York branch is in Greenwich Village, and expand our digital efforts. We are also looking to build new partnerships, especially with the burgeoning church in the Far East.

We have a wide range of Jewish audiences—different ages,

geographical locations, and cultures—not to mention different levels of religious and non-religious backgrounds. We need your prayers as we work to understand the needs of each group; we are asking for God's wisdom to make sure our gospel-centered events and messaging are speaking to everyone in the most engaging way possible as we sow and reap.

Dedication

As Jews for Jesus moves closer to our 50th anniversary year, some faithful staff who have been laboring side-by-side since the early days of our ministry are stepping back, and some have actually moved on. Newer staff have grown into leadership positions and newest staff are just beginning. I believe Yeshua's comment on one sowing and another reaping implies that His disciples are entering into a harvest that has been a long time in the making. In effect, He reminds them they are standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before—from the prophets of old all the way up to John the Baptist.

We likewise stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us. Let their dedication serve as an example for us to carry on, so that we might leave a similar legacy of dedication for those who follow after us. That kind of dedication requires us to continually cultivate humility, recognizing that we are rejoicing in a harvest we did not labor for, as well as laboring for a harvest that we will not see.

I am inspired by this passage in Hebrews and pray that it will characterize not just Jews for Jesus, but the whole church, in these very difficult days. "And we desire that each one of you show the same diligence to the full assurance of hope until the end, that you do not become sluggish, but imitate those who through faith and patience inherit the promises" (Hebrews 6:11–12).



"Be strong and of good courage; do not be afraid, nor be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9

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
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And They Crucified Him
